

DOES INSURANCE PAY FOR HOSPICE CARE?

t dinner recently, a friend asked me why HopeWest needs to fundraise. "Doesn't insurance pay for hospice?" he asked. Like many questions in healthcare today, the answer is complicated.

explained that hospice reimbursement is a capitated payment. What this means is that regardless of the actual cost of the services provided, hospices receive a set amount for each day a person is in hospice care. Often, the costs of providing patientcentered care are far greater than what Medicare reimburses. And surprisingly, reimbursement rates for HopeWest have not increased in the past 12 years. So, the answer is yes, insurance pays for hospice care, but not nearly enough to cover the cost of care.

To be hospice eligible, patients must have a life expectancy of six months or less and no longer seek curative treatment. Once enrolled in the HopeWest hospice program, a

> personalized care plan is developed to meet both the patient and

family's unique needs. Service includes skilled nursing, pain and symptom management, physician services, medicines, durable medical equipment (like special beds), therapies to improve the quality of life, social worker services, spiritual services, and grief counseling. In addition to these services, trained HopeWest volunteers are available to provide an extra layer of care and support to the patient and family.

Because terminal illness can strike at any age, not everyone who needs hospice care has Medicare or the equivalent. Thankfully, at HopeWest, no one is ever turned away due to an inability to pay.

It is fundraising that enables HopeWest to provide the best comprehensive care to our patients and their families without being limited to the Medicare reimbursement. So, to get back to my friend's question, HopeWest needs to fundraise so we can continue to provide the care our community expects and trusts. The kind of care we all want for our loved ones.

As I finished explaining why fundraising is so important, he asked me another question. "What would we do if HopeWest wasn't here?" It isn't often when I am at a loss for words but I think the prospect of the answer stunned me. I shrugged my shoulders and said, "I'm not sure."

or people who are grieving, every day can be filled with reminders of their loved ones, emotional roller coasters and an overall feeling of loneliness. Holidays can often impact day-to-day grief much more.

WHAT YOU MAY FEEL:

- Physical/mental exhaustion
- Increased emotions like sadness, anxiety, isolation and frustration
- Difficulty with reminders, such as certain scents, TV programs or music
- Increased pressure with social gatherings

Handling the holidays while grieving is a right everyone should have. People should be able to express themselves during this time, as well as personally attune to their own needs.

YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO:

- Take a "time out"
- Allow for down days
- Engage in different traditions, or keep old traditions the same
- Have a little fun
- Give yourself time for rest, reflection and self-care
- Attend events on your own terms (e.g. driving oneself to a gathering or telling friends that they may cancel last minute)

You also have the right to memorialize your departed loved ones during holidays.

SOME IDEAS TO HONOR YOUR LOVED ONE:

- Light a memorial candle during special meals
- Give a keepsake of your loved one to a family member as a gift
- Make a "memorial table cloth" out of craft paper where family members write memories that remind them of their loved one
- Create a "memorial bowl" where family members can put on slips of paper their memories of their loved one and read aloud and family gatherings


